Republic Services conducted an audit with the City of Midwest City for their Super Recycler Program. A surprise waste audit is done of the recycling bins. Tags are put on the recycling bins if there is a problem with what is in the container or suggestions for improvement (like tear down the cardboard boxes.) If it is perfect, they are designated as a Super Recycler. Republic Services will give them \$25.00.

This competition happens during the first 2 weeks of October. This exercise helps the City of MIdwest City clean up its recycling program.

Sustain Salon on Their Low Waste Efforts

Sustain Salon, where the "Beauty Industry , recycling and composting all collide"

After doing hair & hair related services for over a decade, Mazey Heydman started her business in the up & coming neighborhood of Metro Park where, she turned a 100 year old optometrist office & house into a salon that's been prospering since late August of 2018.

Since then, Sustain Salon has inspired many of the minds of it's guests as well as other beauty salon professionals in the area. Just like the thought she puts into her clients, she had more than an image in mind for her salon. The entirety of the brand would involve the mission of minimizing the environmental impacts of the everyday salon. When talking about her own industry, she admits "it's one of the largest offenders of our planet, and that a lot of the beauty industry's waste-stream go unchecked."

Being a licensed cosmetologist for 15 years and being hands on in the salon, gave Mazey the experience she needed to find new solutions to the extreme amounts of waste she was creating on a daily basis. These solutions include everything from eliminating plastics, proper disposal of excess chemicals, using refillable, low-tox professional salon and cleaning products to using other waste diversion programs. These companies used in junction with the efforts of Mazey herself include Terricycle, a third-party company that recycles on the commercial level, EcoHeads for water purification and energy saving, and using locally purchased, bulk & non-toxic cleaning solutions from Plenty Mercantile's refill station, and recycling services from Green Circles Salons as well.

Using her knowledge of salon sustainability, Mazey is now providing eco-salon consulting services to other salon industry professionals & provides personalized recycling programs to help collect salon waste.

Some other current practices Sustain Salon uses, range from composting the hair that's cut with the local Fertile Grounds Co-op, to selling Argri Cosmetics. As a result, Sustain Salon (LLC) recycles and composts over 95% of it's waste that would not otherwise be recycled.

When we provide remedies for the ailments of our ecosystem, all may win. When we incorporate our adaptive abilities as individuals in a community, all may benefit. Chickasaw Nation Departments Work Together for the Environment

To celebrate America Recycles Day on Nov. 15, 2022, the Chickasaw Nation hosted a recycling event and trash cleanup. Employees from the Commerce Environmental Health and Safety team addressed an area of highway west of Ada. Their efforts removed 35 large bags of trash from the roadside and medians.

On Friday, groups from the Department of Commerce and the Department of Community Services worked together to host a Chickasaw Nation recycling event.

This event proved to be the one of the most successful recycling events in the Chickasaw Nation to date. Gathering over 10,000 lbs. of paper, more than 100 tires and a trailer load of cardboard, this event diverted thousands of pounds of material from the landfill.

The next Chickasaw Recycling event will be held in April during Earth Week.

Out With a Successful Cleanup

Keep McAlester Beautiful just completed their fall cleanup 2022. The first two weekends of October, McAlester saw almost 500 vehicles bring their bulk trash, tires, e-waste and metal to McAlester Recycling Center. Numbers are still coming in, but we recycled more than 650 tires and 12,500 pounds of electronic waste. Citizens also took 12,764 lbs of brush to the city landfill that will be chipped up for later use. All the metal is separated and taken to two local scrap yards.

Traditionally, Keep McAlester Beautiful holds two cleanups a year, one in April for three weekends, and the fall cleanup consisting of two weekends. McAlesterites utilize these cleanups to rid themselves of bulky hard to dispose of items as well as the recyclable items like e-waste, metal and tires.


